Background:				
thin the Squamish-Lillooet Regional District (SLRD), there are a variety of natural hazards at pose a risk due to flooding, debris flow or damage from landslides. The SLRD has an isting policy for wildfire fuel management which is separate and apart from this policy.				
The Regional District views these risks as being the primary responsibility of the Province of British Columbia. As such, the Province of BC should assume financial responsibility for any required mitigation to protect against these risks.				
The SLRD has in the past and will continue to look favourably upon assisting the Province with any mitigation works in terms of providing oversight and management of professional engineers and contractors undertaking such work within the SLRD. However, any involvement by the SLRD will be on the condition and understanding that any required funding for mitigation and remedial work shall be the responsibility of the Province of BC.				
Relevant Policy:				

The Board of the SLRD recognizes that there are assets and values within its boundaries that are at risk of damage from natural hazards. The SLRD is prepared to plan for, respond to and recover from the impacts of these hazards as required by the Emergency Program Act and regulations, and to ensure that provisions of the Land Title Act (Section 86) are complied with in future developments.

However, hazard mitigation that involves the forecasting and monitoring of hazards and the development of engineering works to mitigate the impacts of the hazard is clearly the responsibility of the senior levels of government (see table below). This responsibility is associated with the level of professional staff required to forecast and monitor hazards and the significant investment required to develop engineering works, both of which are beyond the capacity of local government.

Based on legislative review, the SLRD holds to the position that hazard mitigation is the direct responsibility of the Province of BC. Therefore, the SLRD is not prepared to financially participate in any costs associated with minimizing risk from natural hazards through mitigation works.
